Moon Phases:

Event Reports:

Memorial Day Weekend:

On Sunday May 28, there was an impromptu viewing at Lake Afton. Though the observatory itself was closed, approximately half-a-dozen telescopes were out on the pad behind the building until nearly midnight. The night was very clear and the seeing was average. A few people outside of the club also showed up and were introduced to the night sky. Among the objects observed were: C/2015 V2 (Johnson) [located near Izar on Bootes], several galaxies near Virgo (such as the Black-Eye Galaxy[M64]), M81 and M82, M108 and M97 in Ursa Major. Saturn and Jupiter were also visible. Phil hooked up a video camera to a television and resolved several eddies in the belts of Jupiter, and surely got some amazing lunar images. The Cassini Division in Saturn was easily visible in a 12 inch telescope that another member and brought out. All in all, a pretty good observing night.

Symphony in the Flint Hills:

On Saturday, June 10th the Symphony in the Flint Hills took place at Deer Horn Range in Geary county, near Junction City. Members from KAO and SAC volunteered for the event. An astronomy tent was setup with 4 talks about astronomy: Life in the Universe, Constellation Tour, Space Rocks, and The 2017 eclipse. Outside during the day we had several solar scopes and a scale model of the solar system setup. It is estimated that 100's of people showed up during the day to attend the talks and even more to look at the sun (which happened to be completely featureless in white light and had one small filament in H-alpha) prior to the symphony. After the symphony had ended, there was an observing session with 8 telescopes setup to look at Jupiter, Saturn ,the Moon and Alberio. Several people had never seen Saturn or the moon through a telescope, so we had lengthy lines for over 2 hours after the concert ended. During the evening we estimate that at least another 700 people may have showed up, maybe as many as 1000 between the 8 telescopes. We finally packed up and left at 12:30. All in all a good concert and a good day/night of outreach to over 2600 people.
